



Verner's Law

Verner's law, stated by Karl Verner in 1875, describes a historical sound change in the Proto-Germanic language whereby voiceless fricatives *f*, *þ*, *s*, *h* (including *h*), when immediately following an unstressed syllable in the same word, underwent voicing and became respectively the fricatives *b*, *d*, *z*, *g* (and *g*). (In Proto-Germanic, voiced fricatives /*v* *ð*/ were allophones of their corresponding voiced plosives /*b* *d*/ when they occurred between vowels, semivowels and liquids, so we write them here as *b*, *d*, *g*. But the situations where Verner's law applied resulted in fricatives in these very circumstances, so we understand these phonemes as fricatives in this context.) 84 pp. Englisch.



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
